

FROM JEFF'S DESK

Jimmy Carter was our nation's longest lived President, but his legacy takes shape beyond his political accomplishments. His involvement with Habitat for Humanity raised the profile of this important ministry, and continues to have an impact today (and - in our own back yard). So, it often is with ministries that work to lift up and to build... to walk alongside and to look beyond.

I recently received a book about another such ministry - Room at the Inn, a nonprofit founded by Father Charlie Strobel in Nashville that has evolved over time into a national model for offering care, love, and hope to the unhoused. Motivated by something Robert Kennedy said, "Few of us have the greatness to bend history itself, but each of us can work to change a small portion of events, and in the total of all those acts will be written the history of this generation." Fr. Strobel's work is a part of that history.

He writes of what he did and - why he did it - noting that Mark Twain has said: "The two most important days of your life are the day you are born and the day you find out why." His "why" found form in an impactful ministry among the unhoused - people who needed to know they were seen, and loved, and - cared for. For Charlie, it all came about through a reflection on the Sermon on the Mount, which is introduced by the Beatitudes, which was the moral framework within which he tried to live his life.

The book is a beautiful reflection back on that life, and - on that ministry, and - on the people he encountered along the way. He suggests that every one of us has what he calls "Beatitude Moments" - totally unexpected, grace-filled experiences when one is filled with love. We remember these as divine gifts from above - not simply memories.

Sometimes, they lead us in the writing of our little part of the history of our generation. Sometimes, they are the seed that is waiting to be planted. But in all times, this is a beautiful way to live our lives - being open to *beatitude moments*, and then - doing something about them - sharing the grace we ourselves have received.

The Dash

"After walking through a cemetery, a man said, 'Have you noticed how much meaning a dash can have? Born 1921–Died 1981. What a way to summarize a life—with a dash!' That will eventually describe the years of every person's life—a dash. We cannot stop our movement toward the final destination, but we can choose what we do with our dash. We can spend it on significant matters or on meaningless trivia. Thus a congregation's ministry of stewardship is a matter of ultimate importance—far more significant than fund-raising.

"Shrouds have no pockets. We do not see Brinks trucks in funeral processions. Hearses do not pull U-Haul trailers. But stewardship lets us take it with us. 'Lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal' (Matt. 6:20). Through prudent stewardship, we can enter the abundant life of joy and meaning. Through stewardship, we can protect ourselves from being possessed by our possessions, thinking they are permanent and that they buy permanent security. Through stewardship, we can grow spiritually. Through stewardship, we create a meaningful dash." [*The Vital Congregation*, Herb Miller]






