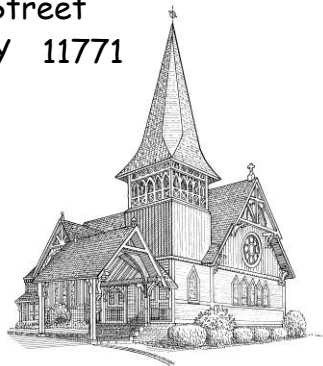

FROM JEFF'S DESK

As you follow Christ into the wilderness of Lent, consider what it means for the church to not just contribute to culture but also stand against culture—not out of fear, but because the church's message and witness stand in contrast to the world.

"In a divided world, may we speak of our unity in Christ. In the midst of a scarcity mindset, may the church be generous in all things. When the world is at war, let the church work for peace and the flourishing of all. Amidst the shouts of "hate," may we live "love" and follow the God of love to the cross."

Looking ahead to a Lenten Worship Series, let's spend some time with the disciples walking on the road to Emmaus (Luke 24). These two disciples traveling from Jerusalem to the village of Emmaus on the evening of Easter Sunday are on a journey that began in sorrowful despair at the sudden death of their beloved friend and master. However by the time they reach their destination their outlook is completely transformed into one of light and hope. An unrecognized traveler joins them, and the conversation he holds with them causes their hearts to burn with new insight and excitement. This encounter changes their lives—a journey from blindness to enlightenment, from darkness to sight.

The motif of light as a symbol of increasing spiritual discernment is a favorite of Luke's. When John the Baptist is born, his father, Zechariah, prophesies that his son will prepare the way for the coming of God's mercy, just as the morning light breaks on those sitting in darkness (Luke 1:78, 79). The night sky outside Bethlehem is brilliant with angelic light as Jesus' birth is proclaimed (Luke 2:13, 14). Dim-eyed Simeon pronounces that he has seen God's salvation: a light to the nations, and glory to Israel (Luke 2:28-32). As he comes of age, Jesus announces the commencement of his public ministry by saying that the Spirit has anointed him to proclaim release from oppression and sight to the blind (Luke 4:16-21).

The dynamic of light and darkness, sight and blindness invites us to explore how much we see. Like a city on a hill at night, like a lamp on a stand, the kingdom is here. Even more, the risen Jesus is here! Where do we see him? How much of his kingdom presence do we recognize in our midst?

SESSION NOTES

The Session of the First Presbyterian Church of Oyster Bay held a regular meeting on January 27, 2026 on Zoom due to snowy weather.

Jeff welcomed newly elected Elder Jim Brundige.

CLERK'S REPORT: At worship on January 4, 2026 Jim Brundige was ordained and installed as an Elder. Ya Ming Chen, June Hux and Eileen Pollitt were installed as Deacons.

Session elected the following officers for 2026: Richard Kveton, President of the Board of Trustees; Kris Lalonde, Treasurer; Cathy Hogg, Clerk of Session.

Cathy noted with sadness the loss of church member Frank Hudak, who died in 2025. His name will be removed from our roll of active members. She also noted with sadness the death of Richard Longworth on January 10, 2026.

Session voted to approve the annual Statistical Report for the Presbytery. Cathy will submit it to Presbytery and include it in the book of Minutes.

MODERATOR'S REPORT: Communion was celebrated on Sunday, January 4, 2026, as authorized by standing resolution of December 16, 2025.

Session approved changing the celebration of communion from Easter Sunday, April 5, 2026, to Palm Sunday, March 29, 2026, to coincide with the Children's Pageant.

CHURCH SUPPORT: Richard reviewed the final numbers for 2025 and reported that 2025 was very successful year. Richard noted a most promising trend since the Fall of 2025 where monthly revenues exceeded monthly expenditures and noted that for the full year 2025 all revenue categories exceeded their budgeted amount. He is encouraged that pledge and plate offerings were over budget, especially as pledges so far for 2026 are about \$80,000 short of the goal of \$250,000. As in the past, he is hopeful this amount will in fact be covered.

Jeff noted our strong financial position is built upon a faithful and generous membership, a physical plant that lends itself well to use by a variety of rent paying organizations and film crews, and a creative membership that finds new ways to raise money through events like the Oyster Fest parking and the Holiday Fair.

PRESBYTERY REPORT: The next Presbytery Meeting will be on Tuesday, February 3 at 6 pm on Zoom. Jeff will attend and Session voted to elect Richard to be our Elder representative.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE: Session elected Richard Kveton and Isa Gutierrez to be our reps to the Nominating Committee.

ELDER TRAINING: Session in planning a mini retreat on February 28 to discuss topics from the Long Range Plan.

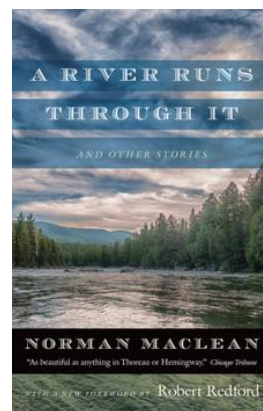
BOOKIES
